'The Case of Rose of Aberlone: Michigan's Great Contribution to Contract Law'

Guest Speaker, Norman Otto Stockmeyer The Case of Rose of Aberlone: Michigan's Great Contribution to Contract Law Open to the public

aw professor Norman Otto Stockmeyer will be the featured guest speaker at the Friends of the Plymouth Historical Museum meeting on Tuesday, November 10 at 7:30 PM.

The title of his presentation is, "The Case of Rose of Aberlone: Michigan's Great Contribution to Contract Law."

The presentation will examine

the sales contract between Theodore Sherwood, a Plymouth farmer, and Hiram Walker, a Detroiter who made a fortune with Canadian Club whiskey, and their epic 1886 lawsuit over a supposedly barren cow, "Rose of Aberlone."

The resulting opinion handed down by the Supreme Court of Michigan in 1887, invoking the doctrine of mutual mistake, became a legal classic, and is a primary case study for first-year law school students.

The court ruled that the defendant (Walker) could refuse to honor the contract to sell the cow to Sherwood because both parties made a mutual mistake. They did not know that the cow was actually fertile at the time the contact was signed.



Featured guest speaker Professor Norman Otto Stockmeyer, who recently retired from Thomas M. Cooley Law School in Lansing, where he taught contract law for 35 years, will speak about a legal suit filed in 1886 by a Plymouth farmer that became one of the most celebrated contract cases in American history.

A plaque was placed in Kellogg Park in Plymouth in September 1993 to commemorate the historic contract case involving Theodore Sherwood of Plymouth vs. Hiram Walker in 1887, and the sale of Rose the cow. The Michigan Supreme Court ruled Walker could rescind his agreement to sell the cow to Sherwood because of a mutual mistake.

Electrical Work

Earlier this year, we contracted to have an electrical assessment done of the entire Museum building. The assessment was paid for through a grant from the Community Foundation of Plymouth and an anonymous donor. The assessment found a number of issues that needed attention, some with more urgency than others.

For the past couple months, O'Donnell Electric of Plymouth and Whitmore Lake has been whittling down the list, all the while making the building safer for all who enter. There are still a number of items that need to be accomplished to bring the building up to code. We've been using money from the Building Reserve to pay for the work so far, but we needed more money to finish the list.

The Plymouth Historical Society has received a generous grant of \$25,000 from the Margaret Dunning Foundation, which will hopefully allow us to complete the electrical work.

Plymouth Ghosts Cemetery Walk Sold Out Again!



Several merchants and the Chamber of Commerce had complained that the lot was always full.


THE TEST told them there were enough spaces elsewhere for the employees of the businesses around the central lot.
